SHARI ERICKSON (born 1948)

American contemporary painter Shari Erickson gained early recognition as a figurative muralist in her home city of Atlanta, Georgia. After graduating with honors from The Ringling School of Art, Sarasota, Florida, she became an accomplished drawing instructor, potter, and jewelry designer. From early on, her personal focus has been the creative contemplation of the human form. This remains at the heart of her authority, while the exploration of light and bold color always infuses her work.

Among others, USAir and Liat Air have published Erickson's images to promote their Caribbean island destinations. The United States Department of the Interior chose her work for its Virgin Islands Park service publications, and she has designed book covers for Macmillan Caribbean publishers. Although Erickson spends much of her time exploring the Caribbean with artist husband Douglas K. Gifford, many of her alkyd-oil, alla prima studies are completed in their Smoky Mountains studio in Cashiers, North Carolina. Erickson's tropical images are currently exhibited throughout the southeast United States and the West Indies.

DOUGLAS GIFFORD (born 1948)

Douglas K. Gifford was born in Evanston, Illinois. He began painting in 1967, at which time he transferred from Bucknell University to The Ringling Art School, Sarasota, Florida. After graduating, cumulative awards and commissions led to one-artist shows in New York City; Palm Beach and Naples, Florida; and Nantucket, Massachusetts.

A representational painter of architecture, an early influence on Gifford was Edward Hopper. His constructionist concept of space eventually led to his invention of a three-dimensional technique he calls Stereo Schema Realism, which is unique to him. Recently, his focus has evolved to include the built environments of the Caribbean. "West Indian architecture, whether colonial or native, is obliged to be both practical and exuberant – like the people," Gifford observed. The applied specifics of verandahs, galleries, louvers, and shutters along with the cultural influences of the English, French, African, Spanish, and Dutch blend exotic images. His work speaks to the viewer conceptually as well as literally,

and teaches us to see what we previously only assimilated. Gifford has created his own place in the world of contemporary art, just as he created his own style and technique.






FRITZ HENLE (1909-1993)

Fritz Henle was born in Dortmund, Germany in 1909, and studied photography in Munich. He began a career that spanned six decades in Germany in 1928, and traveled through the Mediterranean, India, China, and Japan in the pre-war 1930s, documenting those travels with his trusted Rolleiflex, before emigrating to the United States in 1936. Passionately involved with the relatively new medium of photography, Henle was at once a successful freelance photojournalist working for Life magazine beginning in 1937, a top fashion photographer in New York during the 1940s and early 1950s, and a portrait photographer sought after by notables of the time. He was also a well traveled documentary photographer whose work took him to Asia in the pre-war 1930s, and later to Mexico, Paris, throughout the United States, and to the Caribbean in the late 1940s - where he traveled the islands before making his home on St. Croix in 1958.


Tirelessly prolific, Henle published nineteen books of his work, from his first on Japan in 1936, to his photo essay on Catalan cellist and conductor Pablo Casals at age ninety-five in 1975. His photographs were published over the decades in countless magazines, among them cover stories for Life; fashion editorials shot for Harper's Bazaar, Mademoiselle, Town & Country, and others; features in photography periodicals; and illustrations in the Travel section of the Sunday New York Times. Numerous one-person exhibitions of his photographs, beginning with This is Japan in Tokyo in 1936, helped to establish him as a creative visionary with an exceptional technique, a keen sense of striking composition, and a determination to capture the beauty in life. Arguably one of the best known photographers in America by the mid 1950s, Fritz Henle, who died in 1993, has been described by the late photo historian Helmut Gernsheim as the last of the great classical photographers.

Founded in 1964, the U.S. Department of State's ART in Embassies Program is a unique blend of art and diplomacy. Through exhibitions with diverse


