
# The United States Embassy to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia

#### Welcome

Welcome to Quincy House, the official Residence of the United States Ambassador to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

The works of art displayed throughout the house comprise an exhibition organized by the ART in Embassies Program. Together we chose these particular pieces to present a sample of the creativity and dynamism of contemporary American artists. I hope that during your visit to Quincy House you will take the time to experience the varying visions of America that these diverse pieces present.

The works represent a wide spectrum of content and materials, and were created by both young artists in the early stages of their career and prominent, well-established artists whose works can be found in museums. The artists, both men and women, live throughout the United States, from the East Coast to the West Coast and from North to South. This diversity makes it a very American exhibition. The ever-changing nature of American culture is expressed in the energetic color lithograph, Stars and Stripes at the Speed of Light, while the mixed media work, The Shirt, is inspired by the ancient and enduring traditions of the American Indians. Just as the quiet of the American plains differs from the 24-hour vibrancy of U.S. cities, the elegant simplicity of the black and white lithograph, Leaves, is contrasted with the exuberance of the silkscreen, Composition III. And as different as the Rocky Mountains are from the Everglade swamps, so the abstract vision of Domicile varies from the almost photographic realism of Cisco No Services. Some of the works are quietly reassuring while others are challenging, like many aspects of contemporary American culture.

We hope that you find this exhibition as stimulating and inspiring as we do. We also hope that it provides you with some insight into the wonders of the country that we are privileged to represent.


## The ART in Embassies Program

Through exhibitions with diverse themes and content, ART presents more than 3,500 original works of art by U.S. citizens in a variety of media and styles. They are obtained through loan from sources that include museums, galleries, corporations, artists, and private collectors, and displayed in the public rooms of some 170 U.S. Embassy residences and diplomatic missions worldwide.

The ART exhibitions are a source of great pride to U.S. ambassadors, assisting them to reach the host country's educational, cultural, business, and diplomatic communities. In viewing the exhibitions, the thousands of guests who visit U.S. Embassy residences each year have the opportunity to learn about our nation – its history, customs, values, and aspirations – by experiencing American art firsthand. 




